#### REMEMBERING THE VALUE OF A LIBERAL ARTS EDUCATION

I enjoyed learning about the shortlived Feminist Alliance's "Woman's Guide to WMC" (wish I had known of it during my tenure!), the advocacy of Jasmin Chavez Cruz '19 and Christina Walter Wingert '03, the growth of the McDaniel Women's Leadership Network, and 1965 alum Dianne Briggs Martin's awesome career in computer science. Great quote from her about working for IBM on the Apollo project:

"I had to watch the moon landing on the television like everybody else. I was 8 1/2 months pregnant at the time, and they wouldn't allow women — especially pregnant women — in Mission Control. I wanted to go back and work for IBM after having my first child, but they wouldn't allow women to work part time at that point. They lost a lot of good talent that way."

I'd like to think things have changed, but sadly a lot of good talent is still lost that way (assuming they got through the door in the first place).

I stopped by the Hill in mid-December with my then-10-year-old who was adamant that he hated school and absolutely was not going to college. That brief visit to the Hill, even though no one was around and most of the buildings were locked, convinced him that he did want to go to college - to study computer science. I advised that maybe a liberal arts school wasn't the best place for that course of study. Your profile of Dianne Briggs Martin makes me reevaluate that advice!

# McDANIEL ANNOUNCES NEW LEADERSHIP

Over the summer, the college announced several new leadership team members. They include:

- 1. Dean of Students Phillip A. Sullivan: Sullivan, who most recently served as associate dean of campus life and director of residential education and services at Oxford College of Emory University, was selected as McDaniel's new dean of students following a national search. He assumed the role at McDaniel effective Aug. 19, 2024.
- 2. Dean of the Faculty Mary Bendel-Simso: English professor Mary Bendel-Simso has been promoted to dean of the faculty. As Professor of English at McDaniel, Bendel-Simso has taught in the English Department since 1995. She has served as faculty secretary and on various faculty committees, including two terms on the faculty affairs committee.
- 3. Assistant Dean of Faculty Development and Director of the Honors Program Chloe Watson Irla '07: Chloe Watson Irla '07 begins as assistant dean of faculty development and director of the Honors Program. She has taught digital art and design courses at McDaniel since 2016. She was promoted to associate professor of Art in 2022 and, most recently, served as chair of the Art Department. She also served as a special advisor to the provost on well-being initiatives.
- 4. Executive Director of the Center for Experience and Opportunity Joan Liptrot: Joan Liptrot has been promoted as the new executive director of McDaniel's Center for Experience and Opportunity. Liptrot, who joined McDaniel in 2023 as director of international and off-campus programs, has more than 30 years of experience in education. She was previously director of service and civic engagement at Rider University.
- 5. Director of Master of Science in Occupational Therapy Cathy Felmlee Shanholtz: Cathy Felmlee Shanholtz has been named the inaugural program director for McDaniel's new Master of Science in Occupational Therapy. The program has received approval from the Maryland Higher Education Commission and is expected to begin in summer 2026, pending approval by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education. Felmlee Shanholtz is working on a Ph.D. in Organizational Leadership from Shenandoah University, where she was program director for the Master of Science in Occupational Therapy programs at the Winchester and Leesburg, Virginia, campuses and served as the division director of Occupational Therapy.



# GREEN TERROR FOOTBALL FAMILY

There are plenty of multigenerational alumni families who have kicked off their careers here on the Hill. But for one family, the legacy they left has been inextricably tied to the Green Terror football program since the 1950s.

Robert "Bob Sr." Butler '57 (Economics), Robert "Bob Jr." Butler '83 (Business Administration), and Woodrow "Woody" Butler '12 (Graphic Design and Art History) each spent much of their college years on the football field, learning how the sport applies to the real world and making friends to last a lifetime: "I went there simply to play football and earn an Army commission," says Bob Sr. "I left there with a degree, a career, and a wife, all of which formed the foundation for the rest of my life."

"Growing up in a military household, we moved so often it was hard to establish any real, lasting friendships," says Bob Jr. "WMC gave us our first taste of that, and the friends I made there are still my closest friends today."

For this three-generation Green Terror football family, it's a time-honored tradition that may not yet be over.



#### WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO ATTEND McDANIEL/WMC?

ROBERT "BOB" BUTLER SR. '57: "I decided to attend Western Maryland College (WMC) because it offered me the best scholarship, was close to home, and I knew several of the football players who were already there. I had not considered college until my senior year in high school but had thought of an Army career. As a result, I enlisted in the Army Reserves while still in high school. I found out about the ROTC program and that was one of my major motives to give college a try."

**ROBERT "BOB" BUTLER JR. '83:** "I chose WMC primarily because both of my sisters (Della Butler Hager '81 and Donna Butler Nichols '82) were attending, they both liked it — as I did on my visits — and I figured it would make the logistics of college life on the family a whole lot easier."


WOODROW "WOODY" BUTLER '12: "I chose to attend McDaniel for the wide variety of options in majors and course focus, and I liked the small school and small class sizes. The ability to play multiple sports as well as the family ties ended up being the final piece in solidifying my decision."


## WHAT DO YOU STILL CARRY WITH YOU FROM YOUR STUDENT-ATHLETE EXPERIENCE?

**BOB SR.:** "My four-year experience in football at WMC was disappointing as far as win/loss records were concerned. However, they were very rewarding in lifelong friendships and long-remembered highlights of individual plays and games. I learned that individual relationships between players and coaches are a vital aspect of the game and without them, the enjoyment and the success of the program is diminished."

BOB JR.: "I loved my entire experience of playing football at WMC. I especially enjoyed the team camaraderie. Jim Hindman was a tough coach and an easy man to admire. He worked us hard, but the harder we worked, the more tight-knit the team became. I enjoyed that. Appropriately, in the photo I sent you (opposite page, right), I am on the bench, which is where I spent most of my time. I am number 82. Mark 'Toke' Jordan '83 is number 77. He was my roommate and best friend, and still is. Playing football is relatable in so many ways to everyday life and life in business. The more you put into something, the more you will get out of it."

**WOODY:** "Although our record was not what I wished it could have been, it was still a very enjoyable experience. Some of my best friends to this day are a result of my time on the team. I also believe the academic benefit of the work and scheduling needed to be a student-athlete is a great precursor to successful work-life balance after graduation. Teamwork and dedication to a group of people around you, regardless of the outcome, is one of the best lessons someone can experience."





#### WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE GREEN TERROR FOOTBALL MEMORY?

**BOB SR.:** "I'm very proud of the fact that both my son and my grandson played at WMC/McDaniel. I enjoyed their games and relived many of my experiences through them. I believe we may be one of very few families to claim three generations of football at the same college. I now have eight great-grandsons, so, who knows what the future holds?"

**BOB JR.:** "My favorite football moment is from Woody's career, when he caught the winning touchdown pass against Gettysburg College at home in the last minutes of the game. I was also proud to be an honorary captain with my father and flip the coin at one of Woody's games."

# LAYINGTHE FOUNDATION FOR A

HOW TWO MULTIGENERATIONAL GREEN TERROR FAMILIES HAVE BUILT LIVES FOR THEMSELVES — AS INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILY UNITS — AT McDANIEL

When deciding which college to attend, it's not often that a 17- or 18-year-old is thinking about whether their final choice will be a place that their future children or grandchildren will want to attend when the time comes. Instead, the focus is on whether the education obtained at a school will get them where they want to be professionally, whether they will feel at home on campus, and whether they will find the community they seek to live a fulfilling life.

ut for many who have chosen to spend four years here on the Hill, their time became an investment in laying the foundation for a family legacy they never could have foreseen. For two such families, their stories began with courageous first steps on the Hill by Sharon Head '88, Sue Head Conklin' '94, and Erika Herron Hall' '99. Those three women each forged a path for the next generations of their families to find family of their own—whether in the form of future spouses or chosen family—who helped them find their best selves and remained in their lives for decades after graduation.

"My husband, Mark, is a very supportive guy," says Hall of her husband, who is not an alum but can often be found at Homecoming wearing McDaniel gear proudly boasting "WMC Husband and McDaniel Dad."

"We were together in high school, and I went away to McDaniel for college. He has always supported me, no matter what," Hall says. "He tells me, 'If there was no McDaniel, there'd be no us. There'd be no you. They set the foundation for you, and we wouldn't be in the position that we are today without McDaniel."

No matter the story, McDaniel College is honored to have many multigenerational Green Terror families who have laid the foundation for a family legacy on the Hill.

#### A CHANGE OF SCENERY, A CHANCE AT CONNECTION

For Hall, McDaniel represented an opportunity for a change of scenery, a chance to create a new community, and a way to set her future family on a path to success.

"I grew up in Anne Arundel County and went to Chesapeake High School and had never heard of McDaniel," she says. "My dream school at the time was Howard University. But I ran track in high school. We were really good, and our state championship meet was held at McDaniel. It was just a beautiful campus and I was like, 'I could see myself here."

Hall reflects on the fact that her high school did not have many people of color, which led her to seek a more diverse college experience. It would seem that a historically Black university like Howard would be the natural fit then, rather than a small liberal arts school in Carroll County that was, at the time, predominantly white.

"But Howard didn't really fit who I was as a person," Hall says. "They weren't as personable at the time, and McDaniel really was. Marty O'Connell was in Admissions at the time, and she made me feel so cared about and loved. She was a person I was able to go talk to throughout my years there."

Hall's experience on the Hill was made more meaningful by the community she found through the Black Student Union (BSU), starting when she was invited to stay with a BSU member for a weekend as a prospective student.

"I stayed with Diane Drakes '98 and that experience just captured my heart," Hall says. "I also met Calvin Lineberger '97, Prakash Wright '99, and Patrick Douglas '99. I was there with folks who kept it real and showed me what McDaniel was really about, and then when I got there for Move-in, I already had these friends who were there for me throughout my next four years."

Nineteen years after her own graduation, Hall would see her eldest child, Ki'Juana "KJ" Land '22, make a similar decision despite her mother's advice!

Knowing that Land wanted to go into forensics, Hall encouraged her to look into other institutions because she wasn't as familiar with McDaniel's Forensic Science minor. "One thing about KJ though is that everything I say not to do, she ends up doing anyway," Hall says. "Luckily, that meant I got to see her follow in my footsteps."

"I'm from Baltimore City and had been in an urban environment my entire life," Land says. "I wanted to not be in that setting anymore. I'd been on McDaniel's campus a lot when my mom brought us there, and I liked that it was small."



Seeking small class sizes and personal connections with faculty, Land was pleased to already have built-in personal connections through her mother's legacy on campus. "Dr. Lauren Dundes was one of my mother's professors, and I took her First-Year Seminar," Land says. "I soon changed my major to Sociology because of her, and being in the same department as Dr. Richard Smith '00, who was a classmate of my mom's, was another source of comfort and connection for me."

For others — including Hall's younger daughter, current sophomore Mia Hall — McDaniel wasn't an opportunity for a change of scenery, but more a place that felt comfortable and

"The first time I was brought to campus, I was probably about 3 years old," Mia says. "I never thought I would go here. But of all the colleges I was accepted to, McDaniel felt like the best choice for me. I was accepted to Drexel, but I knew city life wouldn't suit me. I'm happy that I chose to come to a smaller, more familiar campus that I feel comfortable on."

Whether it's the size, convenience of location, or the nostalgia of a childhood spent on the Hill, Mia Hall is in good company with Sharon Head, Sue Head Conklin, and their family members in wanting to stick with what was familiar.

#### A PLACE THAT FEELS LIKE HOME

Sisters Sharon Head '88 and Sue Head Conklin '94 were no strangers to the Hill when they enrolled. Having grown up on Pennsylvania Avenue, the two spent snow days sledding on the hill or running around the campus like it was their personal playground. Their father, James Head M.S. '73, had also pursued his master's degree in Physical Education at the college.

"I have to give a shoutout to my mother, Carol, who was a real partner with my dad in a lot of things that he did, especially academically," says Head. "She wasn't a college graduate, but she was a really bright woman who would've been if she'd been born later. We also have cousins on my dad's side of the family who are alums, so there's been a connection with the college in our family for a really long time."

Despite the family history and proximity to home, neither sister began their first years at then Western Maryland College (WMC). Head spent one year at the College of Notre Dame in Baltimore before transferring and moving back home.

"I did a year in Baltimore, a year at Western Maryland, and then I was a little bit lost as to what I wanted to do," Head says. "So, I took two years off and worked in the Registrar's Office full time."

The main perk of that job? It introduced Head to all the faculty members — including her mentor, the late Professor Emeritus Ira G. Zepp Jr. '52., Hon. L.H.D. '15.

"He was just the kindest man," Head says. "Ira was just a human in the truest sense of that word. When I decided to go back and finish my degree, I became a Philosophy and Religious Studies major so that I could spend more time with this really kind person who became my advisor."

After graduation, Head spent almost 15 years working as a librarian for the Carroll County Public Library. She moved to New Mexico in 2004 and became a second-career teacher working with disabled students in 2006, getting her master's and Ph.D. in special education while spending the next 15 years in teaching.

Sue Head Conklin also started college elsewhere, playing basketball at Marymount in Virginia. After a loss in the family, she returned home to Westminster and decided this was where she wanted to be. She took a year off and worked in town while she got her head straight.

"I decided I still wanted to play basketball, so I reached out to Coach Becky Martin," Sue Conklin says. "I started classes at Carroll Community College and then began at WMC in January."

She would go on to meet her future husband, Christian "Chris" Conklin '92, through that basketball connection. Conklin grew up in northern New Jersey, and he says all the schools there were too big and didn't appeal to him. He was looking for a smallschool atmosphere like what he found at WMC.

"I only played basketball for a year, but I got to know Becky Martin and helped out with the women's team my junior and senior years. That's where I met Sue," he says. "She was quiet, kind of a homebody. But I just pestered her for a while until she finally gave in, and here we are."

Laughing at Chris's recollection of their meeting, Sue says, "I'm definitely a homebody, and I think that's part of our legacy here. Our kids — Joey, Jake, and Emily — weren't looking to go far away either, and they liked the McDaniel community and having the comforts of home."

"Undoubtedly, Brad's and Brittany's decisions to attend McDaniel greatly impacted their younger cousins (Joey, Jake, and Emmy) when it was time for them to decide." Head says. "I witness the ways that Brad and Britt are generous and openminded, fully human in the most positive sense of that word, not just with their cousins but with everyone they encounter. And, I know that their way of being in the world is, at least in part, the result of their academic and athletic experiences on

Joey played men's lacrosse (he notes that he had played basketball in high school but, "I was too worried about walking in Sue's footsteps to step on the basketball court!"), Jake competed in both indoor and outdoor track and field, and Emily has been playing both women's basketball and women's lacrosse.

As the oldest child, Joey Conklin may have felt some pressure to continue a family legacy, but it ended up feeling like the right move.

"I was never really considering McDaniel, to be honest," he says. "I thought that I had to go away to college. So, I applied to a lot of schools but never really fell in love with one."

His parents suggested he apply to McDaniel and see what happened, and he ended up being invited to interview for the Dorsey Scholars Program, the highest academic honor at the college.

"Once I gave myself an opportunity to consider it, it felt kind of perfect," he says. "I've been here my whole life. I went to Westminster High School and our family is so ingrained in this community. The Dorsey Scholarship was the icing on the cake and signaled to me that this is where I was meant to be. I had such a great experience and couldn't have asked for more from McDaniel."

Joey's experience on the Hill clearly had an impact on his siblings, as Jake and Emily have followed the path he created for himself by majoring in Accounting.

(While attending McDaniel runs in the family, a love for accounting does not seem to be inherited: "I am not a math person at all," says Chris. "I don't know where they got it. I was an English major and Secondary Education minor.")

Jake, who just graduated in May, is joining Joey in another way. After snagging an internship through the Economics and Business Administration department's annual Interviewing Day, Joey accepted a full-time job with Sturgill & Associates, LLP in Westminster. Things came full circle when Joey was asked to come back to conduct interviews with current students ... including his brother, Jake.

"I could tell he was unsure whether we had just a casual conversation ahead of us or if he needed to be professional," Joey says. "He was extremely professional — even shook my hand and said, 'Nice to meet you,' which was hilarious — but he killed his interview and has been working with us for two years now."





In her teaching career, the Conklins' aunt, Sharon Head, says she has pulled her inspiration from none other than Ira Zepp.

"If I ever got to a stuck point, I would think maybe I just need to sit with this student. This student needs someone to be present in the moment and it doesn't matter if we finish the lesson," Head says. "Ira was a direct model of that for me."

That concept of sitting with someone and being there for them served Head well when her younger sister, Sue, and nieces and nephews were making their college decisions.

"I remember a phone call with Sue when she was really upset about what people might think if she decided to come back home and go to WMC," Head says. "And I just told her, 'You should do what's right for you.' There was a moment when her son, Joey, was in that same kind of decision-making mindset."

She recalls that Joey wanted to be sure that he would have options open to him after graduation.

"They're so much smarter than I was ... than I am!" Head says. "I remember just telling him that I could have done anything with my degree from McDaniel — that he would be able to do whatever he wants with a degree from McDaniel because it's really what you make it.

"What I want for all of them is to just be able to flourish. There's a lot of things about this college and this community that make that possible. I'm really glad that Brad, Brittany, Joey, Jake, and Emily all found a home at McDaniel. I know they're going to be better for it."

Joey, as the eldest of this generation of the Conklin clan, is touched that his siblings observed his experience and thought it might be worth trying for themselves.

"They're great siblings, but the fact that they respected my path and that it was something they could see themselves doing too is so special," he says. "It's a testament to the experience that I had as a student and an athlete, which I think our parents had talked to us about, too."

For Sue and Chris, getting some "bonus years" with their kids at home (all three have been commuter students) has been a nice perk.

"I actually like my kids as adults," says Sue. "They're a lot of fun and it's nice to have them around still."

"It's also been great to reconnect with folks we knew and loved on the Hill," says Chris. "Heidi Snyder Reigel '97 was really the bridge between us and the kids at McDaniel. Her husband, Jim Reigel M.S. '02, M.S. '03, was Joey's soccer goalie coach and they became close. Heidi became a really strong influence in making sure that each of our kids knew they had a home at McDaniel."

Only time will tell whether the Hall family legacy ends at two generations and the Head/Conklin legacy ends at three generations. If the first-generation members have anything to say about it, we may just see more of them on the Hill in a couple decades.

Erika Hall still has one more kid to get to college, and she says she'll be working on convincing him to continue the family tradition. Beyond that though, she's looking to the next generation.

"I think it would be cool if my grandbabies went to McDaniel one day," Hall says. "That would be something else."

"My kids will be like me and do the opposite of what I say," says KJ Land, Hall's eldest daughter. "So maybe if I tell them not to come to McDaniel, they will, just like I did."

Sharon Head has loved watching her family come into their own on the Hill. "I can't say enough about Sue, Chris, Brad, Brittany, Joey, Jake, and Emily" she says. "They are so bright and full of heart and kindness. It'll be a little while till that next generation, but I would say the same thing to them that I said to Joey:

"'If that's where you want to go, then you're going to do great. It's a special place with great faculty and plenty of opportunity," Head says. "But if they want to do something else? That'll be OK, too. Because they'll always have family behind them."

For Roger Casey and Robyn Allers — the couple who asks to be called "Roger and Robyn" and lived on the Hill for 11 years during Roger's presidency — the question of "where do you consider home?" leads to a lot of possible responses. Is it McDaniel College in Westminster? The Budapest campus in Hungary where they recently spent a year while Roger taught classes? Is it in Robyn's home state of Florida, their New York home, or Roger's hometown in South Carolina, where his dad still lives?

As they began looking at their estate planning, Roger and Robyn realized one thing: "Of the various entities in our lives that have meant a lot to us, McDaniel is the one that has meant the most," Roger says.

That's why after 11 years of service as president and special liaison for college relations, the couple committed to a \$2 million bequest establishing The Dr. Roger Casey and Robyn Allers Strategic Initiative Fund. The unrestricted fund will allow college leadership to decide where best to use the money in relation to the strategic plan in place at the time.

We talked to the former presidential couple about what made the Hill so special to them and the legacy they hope to leave behind as Roger officially enters retirement this fall.

What attracted you to McDaniel when you were considering the presidency, and what made you decide this was a place you could call home?

**ROGER** | The thing that attracted me most to the college and kept me at the college is its commitment to first-generation college students. As a first-gen graduate myself, this tremendous commitment to first-generation college students and their success made the place feel like home to me.

**ROBYN** | That commitment extends not just from the administration or the mission statement or the trustees, but also the alumni that we met, particularly those who were first-generation themselves. They were very supportive of continuing that mission and it was always great to hear their stories.

#### You two don't have children. In what ways did you find family here on the Hill?

**ROBYN** | That's one of the questions we got asked a lot when we were chatting with people: "Do you have children?" And we learned that saying no kind of shut the conversation down. So, since we really sort of viewed the student body as our children, we would say, "We have 1,500 or 1,800 kids." That usually got a chuckle and represented how we really felt.

**ROGER** | Over the years, we've adopted a lot of "kids." Much like what I imagine parents feel, every night, when you put the cellphone down, you hope it doesn't ring. But in our travels over the years, we have been fortunate to reconnect with a lot of folks who were former students who really feel like family to us.

**ROBYN** | Neither one of us has much family. I was one of only two children, and all my immediate family is gone now; Roger is an only child. So, most of our lives, we've created our own family wherever we've been, whether that's through theatre, colleagues, or students. Family is a very broad term for us.

**ROGER** | One of the things I always said in my addresses was that a college is not a place, or buildings, or a curriculum. It's people. And you could easily substitute either the word "family" or "home" in there in a similar way. When I think about the McDaniel family, it's always been great to be in New York or San Francisco or Boca Raton and always be able to find somebody from that family to be able to connect with. We're all Green Terrors together.

**ROBYN** | I also recall how meaningful it was for us to live on campus. We saw students all the time, even when the campus was closed for snow days. We had the same home as the students for that period of time. I always said, "This isn't our house, but it is our home."

Roger, you always made sure to bring your parents into the fold here on campus as part of your legacy. Caseys' Corner in Hoover Library is named in their honor, and I imagine their support must have been incredibly important for you as a first-generation college student.

**ROGER** | We didn't have a whole lot of financial means, but with their willingness to support a private liberal arts education for me at Furman, they were always there for me. I essentially said to my parents, "If you'll make this work for a while, I'll get more scholarships or I'll work." By the time I finished, I was going to school essentially for free. But the biggest thing I learned from my dad, who was an automobile mechanic, is this philosophy that you are supposed to fix things that don't work so well. That's part of what my attraction was to higher education administration. You're faced with problems or issues, and you've got to figure out a solution and how to keep things running. That skill set that my dad demonstrated while I was growing up transferred from mechanics to academia. Being able to name Caseys' Corner after Mom and Dad was the least I could do as a "thank you" to them.



Robyn, you were special liaison for college relations while Roger was president, and it seemed like you were always present or leading your own initiatives. What did it mean to you to be such a highly engaged presidential spouse?

 $\mbox{\bf ROBYN}\ |\$  It was a wonderful opportunity to get to know so many amazing people and institutions in town and to showcase our students. In the process, I made good friends and had opportunities to contribute to a number of projects in the community — all of which were extremely rewarding. And on campus, it was great having students to dinner, which we did frequently, and supporting their events and initiatives. Our students always inspired me.

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# What was unique about McDaniel that you don't think other college presidents experience?



**ROGER** | We could remarkably be ourselves at McDaniel as Roger and Robyn. I hear from a lot of college presidents that they have to be a lot more guarded. But a mentor of mine, the late former president at Rollins College, Rita Bornstein, told me a long time ago, "You better damn well make sure they know exactly who you are." And I felt that from day one in the interview process that I could say, "This is who I am, this is what I believe in, and this is what I'd love to do." We were fortunate that we were able to find a home that allowed us to be ourselves and flourish in that environment.

**ROBYN** | Going to the conferences of presidents and spouses every year, I always came away with that perspective. Both of us feel very fortunate that we didn't have some of the problems that our peers around the country faced of having to be careful what you wore to the grocery store and things like that.

**ROGER** | And I have to say that aside from the support provided to me at home by Robyn, the two most important people in your life professionally as a college president are your board chair and your provost. I don't think I could have had two better people for those jobs than Marty Hill and Julia Jasken.

# Why did you decide to make a \$2 million bequest to McDaniel College as you looked at your estate planning?

**ROGER** | It's simple: We're two people who care deeply about this place, and who don't have any family to leave our money to. Fundamentally, you have to leave your money to somebody, and McDaniel is the "somebody" that we think can make the most difference in the world.

## What was the transition to president emeritus like as President Julia Jasken took office?

**ROGER** | It's important as a retired president that you get the hell out of Dodge. Your successor has to have a very clear path to be whoever they are. I hope I've done that for Julia. Of course, she had my number if she ever needed me, but I was not going to be calling her. That also meant I had a chance to get back to my first love: teaching, including a year on our Budapest campus. But as of Sept. 1 this year, I am officially, fully retired.

In addition to the unrestricted strategic initiative fund, the Board of Trustees established the Casey Allers Impact Fund before your retirement, which is specifically to be used to support first-generation students who may need financial assistance to partake in experiential learning. What does that fund mean to you two?

**ROBYN** | That was a really, really special recognition. We were so honored that the board saw that passion of ours and wanted it to live on beyond our time on the Hill.

ROGER | The reality for most first-generation students for whom college is economically straining is that they can't do a lot of experiential learning because they have to work. They can't take an unpaid internship because they need their minimum wage job to make ends meet. They can't study abroad because they can't work without a visa in another country. I heard from many students that the number one impediment to studying abroad was that they couldn't give up their job because their education — and in some cases, their family's livelihood — depended on their income. I believe that getting out of this country is the most educational, life-changing experience there is, even above going to college. So, as Robyn said, we were just very honored that the board recognized how much this cause meant to us. It means a lot to have our names connected to that impact fund.

As a former college president, you are in a unique position to understand how funds are used. How did that play a role in your intentions for this generous bequest to the Hill?

ROGER | The one thing I always saw in higher ed administration was that the needs of institutions change greatly, particularly when you're looking at long-term gift commitments. People might want to make a commitment to an academic program that 20 years later doesn't even exist. But the thing that presidents and boards need more than anything else is unrestricted dollars to do what they need to make the biggest impact. There's good strategic leadership in place, so it's best to leave it to their hands to figure out where the money can best be used. That's why we established The Dr. Roger Casey and Robyn Allers Strategic Initiative Fund.



What legacy do you hope you're leaving behind at McDaniel?

**ROGER** | I just always hope I made the right choices. You never know what the chain of impact is going to be in a job like this. And I just hope we did well by people. Ultimately, we wanted to do this because we're hoping it shows people how much we cared about this place. This is a clear sign that we believed in what the college was investing in when I was president. And we continue to believe in it, and we want to invest right back into the college. I want this to inspire others to give back. I never worked for another college in which the alumni talked as passionately and positively about their experience as they do at McDaniel. I hope we encourage alumni to open their purse strings the way they open their hearts to the college. Whatever we can do to help alumni make that transition would be the greatest thing we could possibly give back to the school.



What does receiving the 2024 McDaniel College Alum of the Year Award mean to Donald "Don" Rembert Sr. '61?

"It's special, because I met the love of my life at the college," he says.

While he's not alone in that respect, he says, he can't help but think of his family — by blood and by affinity — when he reminisces on his history with the college.

Ultimately, it's been a legacy of love that began 67 years ago.

It was Move-in Day 1957 when Don met the love of his life, his future wife, Judy Ellis Rembert '60.

Don and a friend were sitting in front of Old Main when "here comes this 1958 green Pontiac station wagon packed to the gunnels with Judy, her mom, dad, and sister," he says. He offered to help carry a few things — he says he had never seen so many boxes of shoes in his life.

"From that day on, we were a couple and we did everything together. It was very, very special," Judy says.

Don was an Economics major who played on the football team; Judy was an English major. Their meeting — facilitated simply by a man who always aims to help others — was the beginning of a special love story in that special way of college life: serendipity that feels like fate.

Now, 63 years of marriage later, the Remberts have left their mark on the college that changed the course of their lives.

#### FINDING EXTENDED FAMILY IN COLLEGE

"I consider everybody at the college to be a part of our extended family. It's just that strong for me," Don says.

He remembers 1957 as momentous not only for meeting his future wife, but because it was also the year his father passed away. Don recalls the man who became a father figure to him — his high school football coach, Bob Waldorf. Waldorf was hired as the athletic director and head football coach at WMC during Don's senior year of high school. It was Waldorf who encouraged him to apply and helped him find a four-year scholarship.

When Don committed to the Hill, Waldorf immediately took him under his wing, making him feel like he belonged. "Coach Waldorf was like my surrogate father, a wonderful man," he says.

In his classes, Don was greeted with "acceptance and support from professors who raised my level of curiosity." With their guidance, he found greater direction in life, helping him see beyond his night-shift job at a local gas station and his apprenticeship with an electrician.


In particular, Economics Professor Ralph Price "fired up" his passion — not just for economics, but for knowledge, which is the essence of a liberal arts education.

"My time in college gave me a lifetime of memories," Don says. From being part of the championship football team to his participation in the Preachers, Men's Leadership Society, and ROTC, he bonded with classmates he has stayed in touch with for the past 60 years.

The Remberts' extended family includes their classmates and fellow alumni from the Hill, many of whom they're connected with to this day. "We have a tight group, and we see a lot of each other. It's been wonderful," Don says.

"I'm still close with my roommate from my first year on the Hill, Barbara Willis Butler '60, and my sorority sister Pat Welk Wolf '60," Judy says.

#### A DEGREE THAT LAUNCHED A LEGACY

Don graduated as Student Government Association president and earned the Lynn F. Gruber Medal for proficiency in extracurricular activities and a Who's Who award. He was then commissioned into the Army as a second lieutenant, going on to serve in West Germany for four years, where Judy joined him. In total, he holds over a decade of service in various branches of the military, including the Navy Reserves, Army Reserves, and activeduty Army.

His Economics degree and the passions his professors instilled in him came in handy, first in the military, then as a restaurant owner, and finally as co-founder and certified financial advisor at Rembert, Pendleton, and Jackson, where he still works today alongside its CEO, his son Charles Rembert '91.

All three of the Remberts' children continued the family legacy of attending college on the Hill. Don and Judy had naturally encouraged them, and often brought them along when they visited. "My daughter Heather had been coming to the school since she was about 4, so she grew up with it," Don says.

Their convincing paid off, and all three attended or graduated from the college: Heather Rembert Fahmy '85, who met and married Kenneth Fahmy '85; Charles Rembert '91; and Donald Rembert Jr., who transferred schools with an ROTC scholarship.

Now with six grandchildren — who Judy still wishes she "could have enticed" to attend McDaniel — they feel blessed beyond all expectations.

"It's been quite the run," Don says.

## **ENRICHING CAMPUS LIFE FOR FELLOW**

"Rembert" may ring a bell for you, even if you've never met the couple behind the name, because their impact is evident all around the Hill. Rembert House, Rembert Way, and Rembert Field at Gill Stadium were all named in honor of the volunteerism and philanthropy that have marked Don's decades of dedication to the college, which earned him the College Service Award in 2016.

"As you get to know him, you'll find he's so thoughtful and caring toward other people," Judy says. "And actually, we have a grandson that's just like him, who spends all his time helping other people."

Despite the accolades, Don remains pragmatic. For him, being named Alum of the Year is "a tremendous honor, and I'm humbled by it. But you know what? We do what we can do, and the college needs all the support we can give it."

He has been a passionate advocate over the years, dedicated to improving the college for alumni and students alike. In 2005, Rembert established the annual Rembert Lecture in the Economics and Business Administration Department and helps identify candidates for the guest

A Board of Trustees member from 2007 to 2023, he has remained an active member of the Alumni Council and Alumni Association.

As involved as he has been in the past two decades, Don and Judy's loyalty was almost thrown into jeopardy in 2002 when the college waved farewell to a name it had held for over a century.

#### WHAT'S IN A NAME?

The Remberts' story began at Western Maryland College (WMC), a name that became synonymous with family to them, between their "found" family and their offspring who continued the legacy on the Hill. The change to McDaniel College alienated many alums for whom the college held such a special place in their hearts — including the Remberts.

"I was so distraught over the name change, I really was," Don says. "WMC" had been the chant at his football games that he remembers with so much pride and fondness.

Despite his anger at the change, he came to see that it was still the college that had opened his mind to new possibilities, given him direction in life, and provided lifelong friends and family.

"After a while, I reconciled myself by saying, 'Wait a minute, it is a change, but what can we do to keep people connected with the college and its history?'"

Two years after the name change, the Remberts went before the Alumni Council to propose the WMC Heritage Society, an alumni group guided by the motto "Honor the past and embrace the future."

"It was perfect timing," says Judy. "I'm very proud of the society and how it has connected people over the past two decades."

The society's major projects have included raising funds for the publication of "Fearless and Bold," a history of the college by Professor of Mathematics Emeritus and College Historian James E. Lightner '59, Hon. Litt.D. '17; renovating Rembert House, the oldest building on campus; a collaboration with the City of Westminster to add the McDaniel logo to the water tower; and recent renovations in Lewis Hall of Science.

But for Don Rembert, connecting with the college doesn't always mean grand gestures. For him, it's just "participating and living your memories, man. That's what it's all about."

## CHERISHING THE GIFT OF MEMORY AS AN ALUM

"Memory is a gift a man can't live without," Don says, quoting his favorite country singer, Merle Haggard, to describe his gratitude for the memories he made in college.

For Don, this gratitude is part of what motivates him to guarantee future McDaniel alumni can have life-changing experiences, too. As trustee emeritus, he knows alumni support is crucial for a small liberal arts college like McDaniel to keep up enrollment and continue its educational mission.

"We're in a battle," he says. "The demographics are against us, because the number of students in the collegeage category has dropped dramatically.

"Everybody involved in the Alumni Association is an ambassador," he says. "We're advocates for the college, and we have to be active in doing that and take great pride in our school."

The enrollment challenges facing small colleges are part of why Rembert takes his calling seriously: encouraging his fellow alums to treasure their pasts to help ensure the future.

"We've got a tremendous history and a story to tell," says Alum of the Year Don Rembert Sr. '61, and he's always prepared to share his love for the Hill.

# ASSISTANT PROFESSOR EMERITA OF EXERCISE SCIENCE AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION JOAN RITA WEYERS

Assistant Professor Emerita of Exercise Science and Physical Education Joan Rita Weyers of Baltimore passed away on April 14, 2024, at the age of 85.

Weyers joined the faculty in 1963, retired as an assistant professor in 1999, and returned to teach as a graduate adjunct lecturer from 2001-04 for a total of 39 years at the college. She taught physical activity courses as well as Adapted Physical Education, a class that partnered with the inaugural Tournament of Champions, forming a tradition that continues today.

A beloved multi-sport coach, she championed women's athletics on the Hill, earning her a place on the Wall of Fame. She coached the college's first women's soccer team from 1987-90, women's tennis from 1970-83 and 1984-90, field hockey from 1967-82, and women's basketball from 1964-65.

She also coached off campus, including "beep ball" with blind and visually impaired athletes at Westminster High School, and hosted wheelchair basketball games on the Hill for 15 years.

A high-achieving athlete, Weyers ranked among the best amateur women tennis and badminton players in the State of Maryland. After her retirement, she earned numerous medals in the Senior Olympics.

Weyers graduated from Phillips High School in Wisconsin in 1956 and earned a B.S. in Physical Education from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse in 1961. She earned an M.Ed. in Physical Education from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1963, and a Certificate of Advanced Studies in Liberal Arts from Johns Hopkins University in 1976.

She is survived by her significant other, Willam Pollard; brother, Daniel Weyers; sister, Pauline Warzyn; and five nephews, three nieces, five grandnieces, four grandnephews, and two great-grandnieces.



We also made lifelong friends through InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, Sharing the same faith helped us maintain friendships that feel as close as family. Our offspring have become friends; Audrey is godmother to one friend's firstborn: and my husband and I continue to support another friend whose ministries have carried her all over the world. Attending WMC allowed my sister and me to hone our connecting superpowers, which have stood us in good stead for the past 40 years.

Working with and living among military families and college students, Audrey and I have developed a concept of family that extends across generations and geographical boundaries. Audrey spent over 20 years as an Army officer and Army spouse, moving over half


